Current Research: "Ageisms and Narrations in the Early Modern Period"

This project explores how narrative devices, and therefore voices, were deployed to shift and reconfigure discourses surrounding the youth and the old in French fictional works.

Book Manuscript: "French Enlightenment Portraits: A Transversal History of Appearances"

This project blends my research on narratology, gender studies, and corporality matters to relate a history of portraiture practices in French fictional works spanning 1659-1805. By foregrounding portraits, a traditionally underestimated genre, this study shows their key role in the formation of 18th-century French fictional literature. The focus on descriptive practices, furthermore, reveals the important contribution made by 17th-century female authors to French literary history. Lastly, the interest on physical appearances brings to the fore the complex and intersectional issues at stake in the representation of identity and of alterity.
